California College of the Arts (CCA) hosts a wide range of exhibitions featuring leading contemporary artists, architects, and designers and also showcases the work of the college's current students, alumni, and faculty. The college's diverse exhibition spaces, located on and near the San Francisco campus in the Design District and on the historic Oakland campus, offer viewers a variety of ways to experience and contemplate art. CCA's critically acclaimed Wattis Institute for Contemporary Arts is a non-collecting, research-based exhibition venue that often commissions new work and showcases first solo shows in the U.S. for many international artists. The Hubbell Street Galleries, including PLAySPACE Gallery, offer multiple intimate spaces for focused engagement with experimental works by students, alumni, and visiting artists. The Nave—a grand hall located in CCA's iconic academic building in San Francisco provides a dramatic, versatile space to showcase large works of art and group exhibitions. The large Oliver Art Center and the more intimate Isabelle Percy West Gallery on CCA's Oakland campus support contemporary artists working in an array of media.
