CCA Announces 2023 Scholastic Art & Writing Awards Regional Winners

San Francisco, CA—February 23, 2023—CCA has announced the regional award winners of the 2023 <u>Scholastic Art & Writing Awards</u>. Presented by the nonprofit organization the Alliance for Young Artists & Writers, the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards are the country's longest-running and most prestigious scholarship and recognition program for creative students in grades 7–12. This year, which marks 100 years of the Awards, more than 100,000 teens from across the United States and Canada entered more than 300,000 works of art and writing.

From over 4,800 entries across six Bay Area counties, CCA is proud to award **352 Gold Keys** to high school students who brought a distinctive and authentic voice and perspective, originality, and technical skill to their work. This is the first year that CCA has served as the Bay Area regional affiliate, representing Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Santa Clara, San Francisco, and San Mateo counties. These students will automatically be entered into the National Scholastic Art & Writing Awards and their work will be showcased at a pop-up exhibition and in person celebration at CCA on Sunday, March 26. Five of these students have also been nominated for the **American Vision Award**. Additionally, CCA acknowledges the **671 Silver Key** winners and the **1,239 Honorable Mentions** for their inspiring achievements. A list of award-winners can be found at <u>here</u>.

For Gold Key works of art and writing in the Awards' 28 categories—including architecture, painting, flash fiction, poetry, printmaking, science fiction & fantasy, and more—the opportunities for recognition will continue when the works are considered for national honors, including additional opportunities such as scholarships and inclusion in the <u>National Exhibition and Scholastic Awards</u> <u>Traveling Exhibition</u>, the annual anthology of award-winning teen writing, and the annual catalogue of award-winning teen art. Poets who win national awards are considered for the National Student Poets Program, the nation's highest honor for young poets presenting original work. National awards will be announced on March 22, 2023.

"As an art and design school, we aim to provide a platform to support pathways toward creative careers for our middle school and high school students," says CCA Senior Director of Youth Programs and Continuing Education Dustin Smith, who also helped spearhead the Bay Area regional awards and was a participant jurist. "This is one way that we can really make that impact, by showcasing all of the great work happening across the Bay Area from our young artists."
